JOB SERVICE ACTIVE APPLICANT CHARACTERISTICS

Generally, Job Service applicants are non-union workers. Although some applicants are employed and wanting to change jobs, most are unemployed. The total number of Job Service applicants exceeds total unemployment. Because the applicant data is so broadly based its characteristics can be inferred to approximate those of the unemployed.

The total number of applicants statewide increased three percent over the number reported for the quarter ending March, 1979 (Alaska Economic Trends, May, 1979). This would be due to students and possibly school employees entering the labor market with not enough seasonal jobs to compensate for the influx. Compared to the previous quarter, all age groups 19 and under increased in proportion to the total. The age groups for those 20 years and older have dropped which would correspond with seasonal work for more experienced worker, e.g., construction, fishing and lumbering.

There is a higher percentage of male applicants in the smaller communities, especially where there are more outside jobs. Larger cities with employment primarily in trade, services and government tend to have a fairly even distribution of male and female applicants.
